You are almost out of time, but FASCAR kits are still available from Jeff Pearce of the Comanche. You can reach Jeff at 330-714-7892. Kits cost \$5.00 each. The Mandan and Arapaho are co-sponsors so there will be three tribes involved in car inspection and running the competition. See the FASCAR rules at the end of *Smoke*.

Races will start promptly by age group as follows:

- Ages 5-7: 9:00 - 10:30 am.
- Ages 8-9: 10:30 - 12:00 p.m.
- Ages 10-12: 12:00-1:30 p.m.

All cars must be pre-registered either Thursday April 19th or Friday April 20th at the "Y", from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m.

There will be NO registration of cars the morning of the race!

Remember ... All Council members and Chiefs are required attend Longhouse. Chiefs, if you cannot attend, please get one of your tribe members (other than a Council member) to attend and sign in for you.

CHIEF'S ACTION ITEMS SUMMARY

- All event dates are set through the end of the year. Be sure to consult the calendar at the back of the *Smoke* and put the events on your family calendar. We have a great summer planned and you won't want to miss out.
- Chiefs need to provide headcount (rough estimate) for the spring campout at Y-Noah. In your headcount, include the number of second sons so we can plan for the added expense in the budget. Also, if you want to have your tribe partner up with another tribe with cabin assignments, we will need to know in advance.
- The Nation will be supporting the Green YMCA's Partners with Youth *Annual Silent Auction Dinner*: "Celebrating Sports & Leisure". Details are at the end of this edition of *Smoke*.
- At last year's fall campout, several Big Braves and some members of Council discussed replacing the Nation's teepee as we took the existing teepee down. As part of our discussion, someone mentioned that we could get telescoping metal or fiberglass poles to replace our deteriorating wood poles. Does anyone know where we can get poles like these? We're beginning to get serious about planning for the replacement of the teepee, and this information would be very useful. If you know where we can get something like this, please let any member of Council know. Thanks!

Good to hear from you. The state of the Manikiki Nation is good. Membership is up. We have 12 tribes now after the Kickapoo joined us from Jackson Township. We have a solid and supportive relationship with the Green YMCA and Y-Noah. We just finished our best fundraiser ever, which means we can once again continue to leave our surplus in CD's. And we are about to expand the nation with a Trailblazer program that will fold right in with the Guides program. Details are yet to be finalized but I we are looking at moving the age range of Guides back to the national average of five to ten and invite the boys to continue in Trailblazers from 10 to 14ish. We will probably use fifth grade as the transition year. We will then split up events with half the event being full Nation events and the other half will be Guides or Trailblazer specific events. This will allow us to keep the older boys interested with more challenging events and the younger boys will also have events that are more appropriate for their age group. We may even see a resurgence of tribe events with the younger boys meeting in the tribe member's homes. We will be launching the new program at the spring campout and plan to modify the constitution and the budget by the end of the summer. I also hope to see us work more closely with the Indian Princess Iroquois Nation in the future by including them on many family/Nation events. That process begins this summer with a multi national family picnic.

You and I first met in the spring of 2002 at Camp Fitch when you were the Manikiki Nation Chief. Then we had a nice long chat at the following fall campout at Tippecanoe where I became the Cherokee Tribe Chief. I would like to share a story that you started that night. As we were sipping from our convenient store coffee mugs around the campfire you told me that "No kid ever quit Indian Guides. It is really about the dad's". Last spring when I accepted the position of Nation Chief at our fire ceremony, I shared that story with the entire nation. Then I asked all the boys to give their dad a hug and thank him for being a caring loving father. There was not a dry eye in the amphitheatre. Over the course of the rest of the evening, I had countless dads come up and thank me for putting things in perspective and reminding the dad's in the Nation what is really important. One dad even said that it was a top 10 moment in his lifelong relationship with his son. I thank you Paul Giesel for your wisdom and your dedication to the father - son program we all enjoy.

We still have post longhouse meetings at Legends on the third Tuesday of every month. Please join us and I will fill your Snapple bottle with Moose Juice.

2007 Manikiki Nation Father and Son Car (FASCAR) Derby

Race Date and Location:

Location: Green YMCA Gymnasium, 3800 Massillon Rd, Uniontown, 44685 - (330) 899-9622.

Race date: Saturday, April 21st. Races will start promptly by age group as follows:

- Ages 5-7: 9:00 - 10:30 am.
- Ages 8-9: 10:30 - 12:00 p.m.
- Ages 10-12: 12:00-1:30 p.m.

Pre-registration: Thursday and Friday evenings, April 19th & 20th, at the race location, from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m.

Note: all cars must be pre-registered either Thursday or Friday evening; there will be NO registration of cars the morning of the race!

Car Specifications:

Maximum length: 10.0 in. There is no minimum, but the distance between the axles cannot be changed.

Maximum width: 4.5 inches at the widest point, including the axles.

Maximum weight: 16 ounces (one pound). There is no minimum weight.

Maximum height: **Note! Because of the timing gate there is a 6¾ inch height restriction!!!**

Miscellaneous: No mechanical devices may be used to speed up the cars: springs, magnets, moving weights, etc. Cars must run on the four wheels and two axles provided in the kit. Axles must be stationary, but can be shortened. Metal washers, cotter pins, etc, can be used to replace the red plastic washers/caps provided in the kit. Any material is allowed in construction of cars. Any lubrication, in any amount, is allowed before registration. No car modifications or lubrication are allowed after registration, or between heats!

Other:

At pre-registration, car weight and other dimensions will be verified. If a brave cannot make it to the Y to pre-register his car, another member of his tribe, or a family member, can register it for him. The track will be set up for trial runs both evenings, and basic tools will be available for minor adjustments on-site.

Each age bracket will be run as double-elimination, meaning that each little brave is guaranteed at least two races. If possible, braves will not race their first heat against other little braves in their own tribe.

Races will be started by the nose of the car. We will again be using an electronic finishing gate to determine the winner of each heat. Track problems of any kind will result in a 'dead heat' and the cars will be run again.

Trophies will be awarded for the three fastest cars in each age group. Design trophies will be awarded for the three best designed and/or decorated cars, in each age group, in each of two different categories: Indian Theme, and Creative Theme. The criteria for design judging in the Indian Theme are: originality and adherence to Native American themes. The criteria for design judging in the Creative Theme are originality and creativity. Please be sure that any decorative trappings do not fall off the car during the race or in any way interfere with the other cars in the heat. Note that a car is allowed to win for both decoration and speed! Other trophies may be awarded in categories determined by the judges.

In the past we have always completed each age bracket in a very timely manner, so this year are continuing with the reduced one and one-half time for each group. Please be on time and ready to race when your age group is scheduled. As in years past, a little brave need not be present to race his car. His father, chief, or another little brave can place the car on the track when called to race. All little braves that pre-register a car will be given participation credit for the event.

This is intended to be a 'fun' event for the boys and fathers, and everyone's patience and sportsmanship is appreciated. There will be three judges for all stages of the event. One judge will come from each of the three co-sponsoring tribes. All decisions of the judges are final!
